can also go on your



Abbotsford Facts (from Wikipedia)

Abbotsford's colonial development began when the Royal Engineers surveyed the area in response to the Gold Rush along the Fraser River in 1858. This led to the building of Yale Road (today Old Yale Road), the first transportation route to link the Fraser Valley. Settlement grew and the production of butter, milk and tobacco began by the late 1860s. In 1889, former Royal Engineer John Cunningham Maclure applied for a Crown Grant to obtain the 160 acres (0.65 km2) that would become Abbotsford.

There is some controversy over the origin of the Abbotsford name. The most commonly cited origin is that Maclure named the land Abbotsford after family friend Henry Braithwaite Abbott, the Western Superintendent of the Canadian Pacific Railway. Until 1922 the name was spelled Abottsford. Maclure's sons later stated that the property had actually been named for Sir Walter Scott's home, Abbotsford, while in his later years Maclure himself claimed that the naming had been "a combination of two ideas".

RECENTLY COMPLETED AREA MEETING

On June 24th, an Oregon area meeting was held in the Hillsboro area at three companies. We had a great turn-out of 35 participants with both members and non-members. The tour began at Farmington

Gardens in Beaverton for introductions, then loaded the bus for the short trip to Eshraghi Nursery.

Farmington Gardens is a retail garden center and Eshraghi Nursery is a wholesale nursery, both owned and managed by David and Linda Eshraghi. Eshraghi Nursery specializes in Japanese maples, grafted conifers and woody ornamentals. The company also produces Christmas wreaths and garlands. While at the main location of Eshraghi Nursery, we were able to walk through the propagation and grafting greenhouses and watch both cutting and maple grafting demonstrations. Our walking tour concluded with a tour of the finished product and the canning machine.

For our next stop, we toured Blooming Nursery, owned by IPPS member Grace Dinsdale. Blooming Nursery is best known as producers of perennials, though they also grow annuals, ground covers, herbs and ornamental grasses. At Blooming Nursery, we toured their state-of-the art propagation and production greenhouses. We were also able to see their cutting station and ebb & flow watering. The tour also included an explanation of Blooming Nursery's solar water heating system, which serves as bottom heat for one greenhouse range.

Our last stop was at Gold Hill Nursery, with IPPS member and OAN President Matt Gold. Gold Hill is a family-owned business operated by the third generation of the Gold Family. Gold Hill Nursery grows a wide variety of woody ornamentals, specializing in topiary and sculpted plants. The Gold family also has an equipment business called Midas Nursery Solutions. They are a leading nursery in lean practices and

automation. We began the tour with short videos demonstrating the specialty equipment that they use, including specialized trimming machines, fertilizer

applicators and

field digging machines. Gold Hill Nursery then toured us through their propagation and liner greenhouses, as well as demonstrated their Da Ros transplanting machine.

For our final destination, we returned to Farmington Gardens for lunch in the display garden and had a chance to "seek and share" with colleagues.


